In what subjects will I be assessed?

Students need to have scores from the three areas of writing, reading, and math. (We do not use science scores).

Who is exempt from presenting scores?

Any transfer student who successfully completed a college-level English or college-level math course (from a regionally accredited institution) should be exempt from that specific assessment. Students must verify completion with a transcript showing a 2.0 GPA or higher in that specific course. Any person who holds an Associates of Arts, Science or Professional Studies, Bachelor's, Master's, or Doctorate degree (from a regionally accredited institution) should be exempt.

Industrial Tech students are exempt from presenting placements scores. (Ag transfer student need to present placement scores).

International students with a score of at least 450 – (Paper-based test), 133 – (Computer-based test), or 45 – (Internet-based test) on their TOEFL should be required to take ALEKS, ACCUPLACER or to present ACT, COMPASS, SAT, or Iowa Assessments scores.

However, those with less than 450, 133, or 45 should enroll in Basic Writing - ENG-025 and take the assessment at a later date.

Can I redo an assessment?

Placement scores normally do not change without extensive review and/or learning new concepts. For the ACCUPLACER assessments, one test out of each category is allowed per day. There is a \$10 retake fee per test: Next-Gen Reading or WritePlacer.

For the ALEKS assessment, a prep and learning module is created after the first assessment and students must spend time working in the module before they are allowed to attempt the assessment again. How can I study for these assessments and improve my scores?

The best way to prepare for these assessments is to take as much math and English in high school as possible, especially the last two years

What if I took an assessment several years ago?

Reading and writing placement scores are valid for 3 years from the start the course you are placed in. Math scores are good for 18 months from the start of the course you are placed in.

When and where do I take an assessment?

Proctored Assessments are available in the Academic Resource Center's Testing Center in Fort Dodge on a drop-in basis during the regular academic year at the following times: Monday - Thursday from 7:30am-4:00pm and Friday from 7:30am-3:30pm. Summer hours: Monday - Friday from 7:30am-3:30pm.

Testing is also available at Storm Lake (515-574-1071) and Webster City (515-832-1632), but you should call ahead to schedule an appointment.
